Who are we?

Based in Scotland, AFYD is a non profit making initiative operated by the Police and public sector agencies in partnership with voluntary sector organisations

In 2005/06 we provided the project consultant who designed the Scottish National Angling Programme, a programme that has been accepted by every commercial and non commercial angling interest in Scotland as the way ahead for our sport.

Who do we work with?

Partnerships, comprising of Police and public sector agencies in partnership with voluntary sector organisations, i.e. The Scottish Anglers National Association, Local Angling Clubs, Local Education Authorities, Voluntary Youth Organisations, & the Scottish Environmental Protection Agency.

What do we do?

AFYD is a powerful educational and vocational training tool, whilst our programmes are very much angling based, we have designed and are continually developing a range of inter changeable modules to create programmes for teaching people about the sport and our environment. We operate from our own sites and our courses are designed to compliment the curriculum in both Primary and Secondary Education. We work very closely with local education authorities to ensure a high standard of course delivery both in the classroom and on the river bank and in Scotland represent the Trout in the Classroom U.K. project. We even take the participants fishing!

Our courses consist of:

- Trout in the Classroom & Environmental Studies (Primary Education)
- Game Angling,
- Game Angling Science,
- Fishery Management
- Habitat & Environmental Management.

How to join AFYD

When a partnership group applies to join AFYD it requires the support of the Police and Local Authority from where it will be based. We will assist in providing presentations and information to those interested parties and if everything is approved we will arrange for the new AFYD teams training, provide a full copy of our courses modular lesson notes, with their complimentary power point presentations, a specialist speakers/instructors contacts list, a child protection policy, participant contracts, disclosure applications, and generic risk assessments.

We also provide equipment lists and supplier's information, funding source information and offer public liability and employer's liability insurance for participating AFYD groups enrolled in the programme.

We encourage AFYD groups to operate their own training sites and we will assist them in the design, planning, and proposed development stages of them if so required. We arrange competitions between the participating AFYD groups for both the instructional teams and the course participants and believe in regular shared information exchanges between the groups.
